# California Young Reader Medal program announces 2024 book nominations

Kids vote, kids decide! Ballots due April 1, 2025

[Costa Mesa, CA] - California's longstanding student-choice award program for children's literature announced the 2024-25 nominees today. The California Young Reader Medal (CYRM), now in its 50<sup>th</sup> year, encourages recreational reading of popular literature among the young people of our state.

"Children and teens get more involved in reading when they get to vote and decide the winners," notes Melanie Miller, co-administrator for the California Young Reader Medal and retired literacy coach.

"We thank the hundreds of teachers and librarians who make these books available in their classrooms and libraries, and also assist the children and young people with the opportunity to select the next CYRM winners," she added.

California school-aged children can vote for their favorite nominees in the appropriate categories for their age group and reading level and vote online or submit paper ballots. There are 5 nominated books in the picture book category and 3 nominations in each of the other categories. The CYRM nominees were first announced publicly at the annual California School Library Association conference in Costa Mesa, CA.

All votes are due by April 1, 2025 (postmark deadline for paper mailed ballots). Winners will be announced on May 1, 2025. Promotional materials such as posters are available, and educators and librarians are encouraged to use a tag line of "Kids vote, kids decide!" in outreach correspondence, or "You vote, you decide!" for older students. Teachers and librarians may <u>request outreach materials</u> through the CYRM website.

**Recommendations for following year currently accepted.** Students, librarians, and teachers may make recommendations on the California Young Reader Medal website for consideration next year. Recommended books must have been published within the past four years (2021-2024) by a living author. Books must be works of fiction except for the Picture Books for Older Readers category. Graphic novel recommendations are accepted. Picture books without words are not eligible.

Since its inception in 1974, millions of California children have nominated, read, and voted for the winners.
